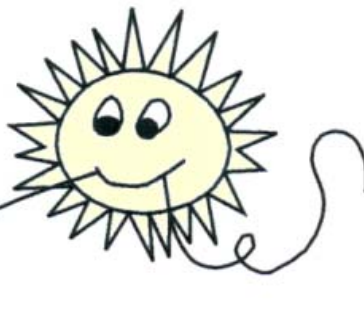

## Letter to The Editor: Reflections on the 19th Annual APT International Conference

The 19th Annual Conference presented, as usual, the opportunity for touching base with those folks we see once a year and enjoying the upbeat atmosphere that make this conference unique. However, the more I reflected on the program and some of the presentations, the more the sense of unease that I felt during the workshops became increasingly clear and focused. I decided to share my thoughts with the rest of you.

As one who has been in the play therapy field before some of you were born, I have seen and heard very little that is really new or perhaps even very relevant to effective therapy with children. What I have discovered is that many of the techniques that we used and took for granted as an integral part of the play therapy process actually have names (we didn't know it back then), but once named took on a life of their own and proliferated into specialties, sub-specialties (perhaps I exaggerate) and an ad nauseam list of techniques, games, special techniques for specific disorders, etc., etc. Please don't misunderstand me as one opposed to new ideas or intensive analysis of what we do that influences successful or, as the case may be, unsuccessful outcomes. It just seems that once we compartmentalize a technique, it takes on a life of its own...if not a cult of its own...and requires special training and God knows how many articles and presentations to ensure that one is competent.

I guess what I am really concerned about is whether we are substituting the proverbial form for substance?? Are we replacing the need for a basic and solid foundation in child development and psychopathology and theoretical orientation with the bells and whistles of "techniques" and games... hundreds of them and growing, an industry of its own. Those of us who have been around for a while (quite a while actually) still remember that very effective therapy with children can be done in a room equipped with only a few very well chosen toys and objects, and a clinician with a basic understanding, whatever the theoretical orientation (and let's hope that he or she has one), of what makes children tick.

## A Very Important Clarification

In the last issue, Lisa Saldaña wrote an article on the process for becoming an RPT or RPT-S. In that article, she stated that you do not need to be licensed in order to receive the RPT designation. When you become an RPT, you have obtained all of the training and supervision that **APT** requires of its Play Therapists. It's important, however, to be aware of your **state's** laws and regulations about what you may call yourself professionally if you do not have a license to practice.

Florida Statutes 491 defines and protects certain titles and activities for licensed clinicians. If you are not licensed, but have earned your RPT, you may want to check with your Licensing Board to find out if you are allowed to call yourself a Registered Play Therapist.

# FAPT Annual Meeting

The Annual Meeting of the FAPT was convened by Lisa Saldaña, 1999-2002 President of FAPT, at a luncheon meeting in St. Louis, MO, at the 19<sup>th</sup> Annual Convention of APT on Oct. 11, 2002. There were 30 members in attendance that signed in.

Copies of the minutes for the May 4, 2002 Board Meeting at which the Board worked on revising the Bylaws and the Policies and Procedures, (presented to the membership as a whole in the Summer Newsletter) were distributed. The Bylaws were presented to those present for discussion and were adopted. Dr. Scott Ryan, Treasurer, reported that we have \$5039.47, which represents, he said, an "upward, steady trend".

Lisa Saldaña introduced and welcomed the newly elected members of the Board, President Janet Courtney, Dr. Larry Rubin, Vice President, and Diana Malca, LCSW, RPT-S, and thanked the outgoing members, Dr. Robert Nolan, Past President, and Dr. Betty Metcalf, Member at Large. Lisa was thanked for all she has done to build the organization as President and congratulated on her new position on the national board of the APT as a Director. She will remain as our able Newsletter Editor.

After the Bylaws were voted on and adopted, the following topics were presented by the Board Members for discussion by participants:

- ◆ A call for nominations for the newly created Board position of Student Representative;
- ◆ The formation of local chapters: Discussion around this topic focussed on the rationale for developing local chapters which include facilitation of opportunities for networking, play therapy supervision and training (with CEs), and leadership development throughout the state.
- ◆ The possibility of having a Florida-wide Annual conference in 2004 in addition to local area workshops. Janet presented this idea as one of her goals as the new president. Lisa added that UCF has been interested in co-sponsoring such a conference with FAPT. Janet called for

people to volunteer for a Conference Committee, with Orlando being proposed as a central location for the conference.

- ◆ Calls for submission of topics for workshops throughout the state. Dr. Linda Hunter offered to explore working with FAPT on offering workshops, and Dr. Larry Rubin encouraged the members not to be intimidated at the idea of giving workshops as many of our members have sufficient expertise in diverse areas and with diverse populations.
- ◆ The need for more opportunities for play therapy supervision. Diana Malca brought this up as another advantage of developing local chapters.
- ◆ The need to reach out to the community. Janet noted that, as a non-profit organization, we have a mandate to develop projects that positively impact our communities.
- ◆ Web site development. A call was made for volunteers to work on our web site, [www.floridaplaytherapy.org](http://www.floridaplaytherapy.org).
- ◆ The need for articles for the Newsletter. Lisa called for the members to write articles.
- ◆ The development of a List Serve through email to which members can subscribe that will allow for discussion of play therapy topics.
- ◆ The possibility of receiving the newsletter in e-mail form. Lisa reported that she has been working on this and that members can e-mail her about their willingness to receive the Newsletter via email. This would represent a significant savings of postage and printing costs and free up money for chapter and conference development.

The meeting ended with those in attendance dividing into groups organized around locations around the state so that the process of chapter development could be begun. The areas suggested at the time included North Florida, South Florida (Miami and Ft. Lauderdale), Central Florida, and Palm Beach County. It was noted that when these groups find that they have become large enough, they could split into separate chapters. Before dispersal, the group applauded and thanked Lisa Saldaña for her service to the organization through her presidency.

# Play Therapy Ideas:

## Therapeutic UNO

As a traveling on-site agency therapist with limited resources, I am frequently forced to pull therapeutic activities out of thin air, and often at a moment's notice. Sometimes, this entails using a board or card game and inserting elements to enhance its therapeutic value.

While running groups of adolescents in an alternative-to-expulsion high school program, my planned therapeutic activities were often ridiculed by my clients. The kids preferred to just play games in their groups. As a compromise, my young clients and I came up with "Therapeutic UNO", which became a big hit. Much to my surprise, I even caught them playing it on their own one day during lunch.

### **Objective:**

Therapeutic UNO helps children and adolescents identify and label emotions and correlate them with personal experiences. It's a good activity for clients who exhibit difficulty differentiating between basic emotions, as evidenced by acts of verbal and/or physical aggression and lack of verbal emotional expression. The activity also helps facilitate interaction in newly formed groups.

### **What You Need:**

- 2 or more players
- A deck of UNO cards
- Piece of paper

### **Set up:**

Before playing, create a KEY with input from all players. To do so, first assign an emotion or feeling to each of the four colors of the UNO deck. For example, your KEY may look like this:

YELLOW: Things that make me happy  
BLUE: Things that make me sad  
GREEN: Things that make me excited  
RED: Things that make me angry

It is necessary to attach meaning to the

non-numbered cards in the deck as well. The players can come up with any meanings that will make the game fun, such as:

DRAW 2: The player gives 2 responses  
REVERSE: The player chooses someone else to respond  
SKIP: The player does not have to respond  
WILD: The player picks the color to which they want to respond  
DRAW 4: The player chooses the color and chooses someone else to respond

### **Playing the game:**

Play UNO as you normally would, according to directions on the box. However, as each card is played, a player must respond verbally according to the KEY.

### **Variations:**

Therapeutic UNO can be creatively modified according to clients needs, and the topic can be shifted depending on the therapeutic treatment goals. To create variations in the game, simply change the meaning of the color cards on the KEY. For example, an anger management group may have the following KEY:

YELLOW: Appropriate ways to respond to frustration  
BLUE: Inappropriate ways to respond to frustration  
GREEN: Things that make me angry  
RED: Things that make me feel calm when I am angry

Therapeutic UNO is an enjoyable and non-threatening way to build a therapeutic component into a simple play activity that children and adolescents can both enjoy and benefit from. With a bit of creativity, the content of Therapeutic UNO can be accommodated to the treatment plan, adapted to the developmental level of the participant(s) and easily utilized in a variety of settings.

# APT's Wroxton Study Group Promotes Play Therapy Worldwide

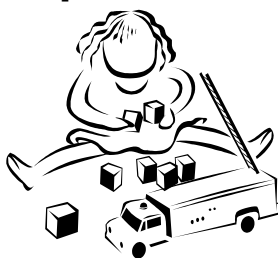
Thanks to the generosity of Nana's Children Mental Health Foundation, I have just returned from Wroxton, England. As the recipient of Nana's Wroxton Study Scholarship on Homelessness, I attended APT's Wroxton Study Group where I presented "I'm Rich: Play Therapy with Children Who Are Homeless."

In an effort to expand play therapy here in Florida, I would like to share what I learned at the Wroxton Study Group. First, play therapy is being implemented across the world. At the Wroxton Study group, play therapists from England, Scotland, Ireland, Denmark, Germany, Israel, Japan, and New York proved the power of play therapy to be effective in a variety of cultures. Thus, be affirmed that you are part of a dynamic, worldwide network of play therapists.

Second, play therapy has limitless depth in understanding and intervening with children. I was amazed at multiple dimensions that were presented such as symbolic play in mental development by Virginia Ryan of England, the Erica Method by Jytte Mielke of Denmark, play therapy with autistic children by Orit Josefi of Israel, and play therapy with school refusing children by Akiko Ohnogi of Japan.

Of particular interest to me was "play therapy as social construction through narratives" by Ann Cattanach of Scotland. Ann eloquently articulated how play therapy can provide the therapeutic space to co-construct narratives to help children make senses of the their "lived experiences." Ann's gripping story of a foster care child transformed through play therapy narratives is detailed in her new book, The Story So Far: Play Therapy Narratives. Hearing about the newly created identity in a child who previously maintained a distorted sense of self brings clarity to my own story as a play therapist. "I am a play therapist who joins a transforming journey with children in a shared world."

Finally, play therapy research is essential to market play therapy as a scientifically proven, effective mental health treatment throughout the world. Play therapists marketing our approach in the United States, the United Kingdom, and other countries need quantitative outcome studies to secure funding for play therapy. Through my interactions with Wroxton participants, I was able to coordinate research efforts on play therapy with homeless children and obtain new research ideas. I would greatly encourage play therapists in Florida to also share research strategies and ideas.



In closing, rest assured, Florida play therapists, that a world full of exciting play therapy colleagues, multiple dimensions, research, and children in need awaits you! Come on out and play!

*Jennifer Baggerly is an Assistant Professor at the University of South Florida, and the driving force behind their Play Therapy certification program. Before coming to Florida, Jennifer worked with Dr. Garry Landreth at The Center for Play Therapy. Jennifer has been involved in efforts to provide play therapy to children in homeless shelters, and has offered free play therapy supervision to the clinicians who volunteer in the shelter.*
